The Rector's Epistle

Dear Siblings in Christ,

Lent has been imagined over the years in various ways: a desert journey, a wilderness experience, spring cleaning for the soul, and more. And these are all good and holy imaginings. I have had the privilege, several times, of going on pilgrimage in the United Kingdom in the footsteps of Celtic and Anglo-Saxon saints. Spiritually walking the path from Iona in the West of Scotland, through

Melrose to Holy Island and finally, to Durham. One of the images from these pilgrimages that keeps coming into my mind is that of the labyrinth, specifically the labyrinth on St. Columba's Bay on the island of Iona. Set in a beautifully wild and remote place, with the Sea next to it and seabirds wheeling overhead, it is the perfect place to reflect on God's goodness in Creation, to experience being alone with yourself and with God, and to enact the movement, the journey of Lent.



The journey begins with a path inward, towards the center, embodying and symbolizing the journey inward that Lent invites us to undertake. This journey into the interior of our souls can be scary- we fear what we might find there, or sometimes what we know we will find there. But the reality of Jesus Christ is that we do not take that journey inwards alone. As we shine light into the dark corners of our being, the One who is Light, accompanies us in love. And the truth is that while we will find a lot of spiderwebs and things that need to be cleaned up or thrown out, at our very core we find the image of God. We find the thumbprint of God at the center of our beings. And once we have encountered that, we begin the journey out- because you can't stay at the center of a labyrinth or of your own being forever, and deeply connecting with the image of God-within compels us to then

move outwards. Outwards to build relationships with others, to serve as the hands and heart of Christ for others.

The good news is that you don't have to go to Iona or anywhere else to take this journey. You can do it right here at Emmanuel. We do this in our Sunday worship, our educational programs, and our opportunities to serve our neighbor. This Lent, in particular, we are offering a Wednesday evening series with a simple soup supper and a walk through time, from the earliest Christian worship service, to the most recent Episcopal worship service. We will learn a little about the Church at a given period in time, then celebrate Eucharist with a service from that era. Volunteers to provide soup and/or bread for an evening would be greatly appreciated!

And on Sunday mornings we will take a walk through our lives via discussion and reflection on Kate Bowler's guides "Bless the Lent we Actually Have". One of the guides is for individuals and one is for groups. Ideally, they are companions to her book The Lives We Actually Have: 100 Blessings for Imperfect Days., available at many bookstores and online. Kate Bowler is a theologian whose studies and life experience have led her to a place of finding blessing in the midst of ordinary everyday life as well as in truly awful circumstances. She is funny, honest, smart, and engaging. Here is an invitation from Kate in her own words: "During Lent, we ask God to show us the world as it is. We begin with the reality of our finitude rubbed on our

foreheads on Ash Wednesday—from dust we were made, to dust we shall return. Then, we walk through that reality in a kind of dress rehearsal. It's the downward slope of God—the Great Descent, where the whole Church walks toward the cross. Frankly, Lent is my favorite part of the church calendar because it is a time when the whole church is on the losing team. A time when we all get a minute to tell the truth: Life is so beautiful and life is so hard. For everyone."

The daily guide provides a Scripture verse, reference to pages in the book, a prompt for a check in with yourself, a link to an excerpt from a podcast, and a prayer for each day of Lent. And the weekly group guide provides a theme for the week, Scripture, some discussion prompts, and a prayer. Ideally, participants will do the daily guide and then meet to do the weekly guide on Sundays- but you can just come to the Sunday discussion if a daily commitment feels like too much!

Participants can download a copy of her guide at https://katebowler.com/blessthislent/ and I will have some printed copies on hand as well. We will meet at noon in the Parish Hall and you can feel free to bring a bag lunch with you.

I invite you to pray and participate in whatever ways you can. And "I invite you, in the name of the Church, to the observance of a Holy Lent". It is a privilege to be on this journey with you.

Rector Housing

In recent years, priests have been moving away from being housed in a rectory, primary because when they live in rectories there is no opportunity to accumulate equity that enables home purchases on their own.

For parishes that have a rectory what are the best options when a priest chooses not to use it?

Keep the rectory – Upside: it will be available if a future priest should want it. Downside: it will require a maintenance, heating/cooling/yard care.

Rent the Rectory – Upside: there is some income to cover costs. Downside: the church becomes a landlord with all the complications involved as well as acquiring tax implications.

Sell the Rectory – invest the proceeds to help with meeting the obligation for rector housing.

The Vestry, on the recommendation of the Finance Committee, approved beginning a process to sell the Rectory. We received permission from the Bishop and Standing Committee of the Diocese to proceed as required by National and Diocesan Canons. The property was listed, and the sale was completed on December 28, 2022.

The Emmanuel Housing Fund was created with the net proceeds from the sale. The fund will be managed by Easton Episcopal Fund and no more than 5% per year will be used to for the Rector Housing allowance.

Lenten Series

Wednesday, Feb 22 marks the beginning of our yearly journey into Lent. This year I invite you to join me each Wednesday, beginning March 1, in the Parish Hall at 6 pm for a simple supper (volunteers to provide soup are needed!) and then walk through Christian history- learning about what was happening at various points in the growth and life of the Church. We will then Celebrate Eucharist according to the custom of the era, beginning with the earliest known Christian Eucharist and ending with the most recent one approved for use in the Episcopal Church. The Burning of the Greens has a long history dating back as far as the 4th century CE and became most popular in Victorian times. The eternal life that Christ brings to the world can be symbolized Christmas greens. The season ends with the coming of the Magi and beginning of Epiphany which is the season of light. What better way to celebrate than to burn the Christmas greens to represent Christ as the light of the world while singing carols and enjoying chili and mulled cider around the fire?!!
